





Getting Buy-in....

Oklahoma State Department of Education (OSDE)

- Stakeholder involvement at the state level encourages a greater community buy-in
- Provides parents and other interested parties with a forum to be heard
- Allows the OSDE to listen to stakeholder input and implement as appropriate
- Encourages working
 improve outcomes for

School/Administrator Perspective

- Schools/administrators <u>want</u> to resolve disputes
- But, they want <u>long-lasting</u> resolution
- And, they have widely varying ideas about how to handle <u>specific</u> disputes
- Past experience with a different system dampened enthusiasm for mediation
- Required resolution sessions improved willingness to include 3rd

School/Administrator Perspective

- Positive experiences reinforced continued participation
- But, constant reassessment
- Mediation in lieu of or in addition to facilitated resolution is popular option
- Mediation without pending hearing complaint is less popular
- Why? Concern about continuing cycle of mediation?

School/Administrator Perspective

- Training in conducting challenging conversations is popular
- But, must find effective strategies to extend it
- Just starting discussions about the form that enhanced parent involvement will take
- Future school use of IEP facilitation option is unclear

Parents- Key Stakeholders

Treat parents and families as the **key stakeholders** they are in their children's education.

- Shift focus from a discrete activity to an integrated strategy.
- Strengthen teachers' and leaders' skills in working with families.
- •Engage families in **accessing** and **using** information about their child's school and their child's progress.



Respect Parents as Stakeholders

- Better Communication
- Parents use attraction not promotion.
- Parents must engage public relations.
- A way to meaningful participation



Parent Perspective



- •The participation of parents in regular, two-way, and meaningful communication involving student academic learning and other school activities, including ensuring —that parents play an integral role in assisting their child's learning;
- That parents are encouraged to be actively involved in their child's education at school;
- •That parents are full partners in their child's education and are included, as appropriate, in decision-making and on advisory committees to assist in the education of their child.
